

The harbor at Bequia is quite busy with ferry traffic and lots of charter boats. It is the best place for private yachts to clear customs and immigration.






Moon Hole is a resort on the western tip of Bequia that was built by an eccentric architect. He used mostly materials he found on the site and made each cottage a part of the landscape. The resort is no longer in business and the properties are being sold as individual cottages.



The *Amazing Grace* does charter day sails out of Bequia to Tobago Cays. We passed her on our way to the Cays.



Tobago Cays is my favorite location in the Caribbean. The reef is about 3 miles long and protects the anchorages. The bottom is beautiful sand with some grass that the turtles feed on. Depths shown are in fathoms.



When a storm comes through it usually brings lots of rain and wind and occasionally lightening but it is usually over in less than an hour.




The islands of the Tobago Cays are uninhabited with wonderful beaches. Iguanas live on them and turtles feed on the sea grass in the shallows





The sand beaches are usually bounded by rocky areas that make it difficult to walk around the island. However you can climb to the top and get spectacular views. You do have to be careful of the cactus.





From Tobago Cay we sailed to Mustique Island. This is a privately owned and developed island with homes that range from \$4M to 20M dollars. The owners are from all over the world and include many movie stars, music performers, business people and politicians. Since almost none of the owners live here year round most of the homes are available for rent. David Bowie, Mick Jagger and Princess Margaret are among the owners.



The anchorage can be very rolley and the holding is not great but they have several well maintained moorings just off the beach for rent.



They do have an airport with a few commercial flights each day but most of the owners use their private jets to access the island



We have visited Mustique many times since 1995 and each time we rent a Kawasaki Mule to tour the island. In 1995 only a few of the roads were paved and you were allowed to go off-road in your travels. Now most of the properties are developed and the roads are mostly paved so you have to stay on the paved roads


